A few months ago, the 29th bi-annual International Biometric Conference (IBC) took place in Barcelona. I hope that many of you were able to attend as this version of the IBC was somewhat closer to us geographically than its predecessors were or the upcoming one in Seoul, Korea, will be. With this in mind, it pleases me a lot to announce that the IBC in 2022 will be held in our region. More precisely, a bid was presented thanks to our colleagues in Latvia, with a proposal to organize the IBC in Riga. This bid was chosen together with another one (Argentina) for a second round where a more detailed proposal was presented to the IBS CAC group at the conference in Barcelona. Shortly thereafter, we were informed that our bid was the winning one. I would like to thank Andrejs Ivanovs for all the work he has put into formulating and defending the bid. Andrejs is the natural candidate for leading the Local Organizing Committee. I would also like to thank Krista Fisher, Alexandra Jauhiainen and Marita Olsson for their participation in that effort. We will keep you informed about the developments of the conference organization and if you feel that you can contribute in one way or another, please reach out to us. I hope that as many of you as possible will be there.

The IBS conference in Barcelona was also an opportunity for representatives from the different regions to meet and discuss various other questions regarding IBS. The IBS officers' meeting was one such occasion and Alexandra Jauhiainen attended this meeting as the representative for the Nordic-Baltic region. Questions discussed included the future workings of the region including membership fee collections and organization, collaborations between regions, GDPR (see below), and a new website for IBS. I would also like to mention our own bi-annual regional IBS conference, NBBC19. 5 Best student presentation/poster at NBBC19

The regional committee of IBS NBR hereby announce a best presentation/poster award for students attending the NBBC19 in Vilnius. The award will consist of 500 EUR and the aim is for the winner to use the award to attend another IBS conference (local or global). The executive committee together with the local organizers will appoint the winner.

6 IBS and GDPR

GDPR, the General Data Protection Regulation, is applicable throughout the EU. During the IBS officers' meeting, this aspect was discussed and where the responsibilities lie regarding following GDPR - with the regions or IBS globally. It was concluded that both IBS globally and the regions are responsible for following these

regulations. Hence, we now inform you as members regarding which information we store about you and what happens with this information.

- We store your name, affiliation (if provided), and your contact information (usually email) in our membership roster. This information we share with IBS globally so that they can register you as members.
- In our Google group, which we use for email communication, we store your name and email address.

We keep the information in the Google group as long as you remain a member. If you choose to terminate your membership, we remove your information from the Google group. We save our membership rosters up to 4 years to keep track of how many members we have had historically, after that we delete the information. If you would like your personal information removed completely from the rosters before this time limit, please contact us. IBS globally follows similar practices regarding your personal information. Please contact the IBO (International Biometric Office) regarding your personal data stored with them.

We will not share your personal data with any other organization.

7 IBS developing countries

Some countries in IBS regions are classified as Developing Countries (DC). This classification is based on the World Bank and their income classification where DC countries are economies with lower income. Previously Latvia and Lithuania have been classified as DC and IBS members from these countries have paid lower fees for membership and conferences. Lithuania and Latvia are now classified as high income countries as all other countries in the region. From next year, the IBS NBR will apply the same fees for all member countries in the region.
